1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

The College being affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam follows the curriculum fixed by the University. An annual academic calendar including all the academic activities of the college is prepared by the IQAC in tune with the University academic calendar and department level academic plan and is integrated in the college handbook. Details of syllabus, weightage of examinations, study materials, question banks and academic plans are communicated to the students by publishing it in the website of the college. Faculty members from various departments in the college have contributed to the curriculum development and assessment of undergraduate and postgraduate programmes as Board of Studies members and question paper setters of Mahatma Gandhi University. Curriculum is complemented with certificate courses, add on programs, hands on activities, project/ field visits, study tours and value added

initiatives by all the departments. Additional Skill Acquisition programme is implemented for developing academic skills. Bridge courses are conducted after an entry level test which helps to identify the students who require remedial teaching. Various clubs and cells along with a proactive NCC and NSS provide curricular and co-curricular options for the students to promote their interests. Regular class wise PTA is meetings monitor the feedback regarding regular completion of syllabus and evaluation. Feedback regarding curriculum is collected from students, alumni, employers, parents and teachers and evaluation is done to plan for the forthcoming academic years.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Newman College affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, adheres to the regulations of the University in conducting CIE and semester exams. College staff council gives priority to prepare an academic calendar in consensus with the department calendar specifying the internal exam dates. There is an Internal Examination Cell for ensuring quality of internal examinations and assessment through continuous and specific method of evaluation. The college have an internal software 'College manager' for the systematic recording and retrieval of internal marks. Assignments and seminars are given to students on each course apart from first and second internal examination. Covid relaxation was given to regular attendance and students were directed to do additional assignment for the year 2020-21. Publication of internal marks, uploading the marks etc. were done by the internal exam cell under the supervision of principal. Monthly tests are conducted by all the departments on limited syllabus and parents' meeting is organised and the progress report is given to the parents by the end of each semester for evaluating students' performance. Internal examinations are conducted in a centralized manner and grievances regarding internal exams are redressed at the department level or through exam committee. IQAC ensures adherence to the academic calendar in respect of the conduct of CIE. Any deviations identified is analysed and discussed for resolution.

It is very important to assess learning level of students who are heterogenous group, after they got admitted to higher education in order to achieve their learning outcome in an effective manner. For this, we are adopted many strategies such as post admission test(PAT) and academic history of students. Further, the measurement of student learning must be ongoing as it provides useful feedback to both instructors and students about the extent to which students are successfully meeting course learning objectives. This continuous assessment is possible through their quality of assignments and the performance in internal exams.

Based on initial and continuous assessment there are many programmes are strategically planned for weak and fast learners. For slow learners each department is conducting remedial coaching and bridge classes to push them up. They are encouraged to submit group assignments and projects to motivate them for obtaining their learning objectives. Likewise, advanced learners have got many opportunities to nurture their talents through programmes like coaching for competitive exams, enrolment in MOOC courses from Nptel, Swayam, cousera etc., opportunities in paper presentations

for conferences and webinars, skill improvement in research activities and moreover, they become mentors for their classmates through peer teaching programme.

Evaluation of each course is conducted in a most efficient and transparent way. The internal to external assessment ratio shall be 1:4, for both courses with or without practical. There shall be 20 marks for internal evaluation and is conducted twice in each semester in a centralised manner. Outcome based education gives a chance for an overall learning where a student gets trained in all the program outcome laid by the University Board of Studies in syllabus. This ensures that a student not only possess a sound knowledge in the specific program they also can have a global mobility and acceptance. The institution follows the following practice of measuring the level of attainment of Course Outcomes (COs), Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs).

Attainment of course outcome: Course outcomes are measured directly

based on the scores attained by the students on their internal and external evaluation on 20: 80 proportions. The internal evaluation includes scores obtained in two test papers for each semester, attendance and assignment presentations. During final semester there is a project evaluation score based on various strategies science subjects' performance of laboratory works for respective courses are also considered for each course in every semester.

Achievement of course outcome can also be measured indirectly by conducting class test papers, quizzes etc. The process of measuring the attainment level of the students is comprehensive and continuous. A lot of other aspects also are taken into account though they cannot be specifically measured with a set standard.

Attainment of Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs):

The programme outcomes (PO) and PSOs can be measured in terms of achievements of students in the competitive examinations in the State and National level. This was testified by the increased rate of qualifiers in various national level examinations such as GATE, NET, JRF, and many other similar examinations of national repute. The rate of enrolment to higher education, placements, awards and recognitions received by the students during and after the academic periods are also good tools for measuring Programme.

Performance in co curricular and extracurricular activities are some other tools of the outcome.

Indirect way of attainment tools are course feedback survey, alumni survey and employer survey. All these surveys use a detailed questionnaire prepared to relate all program outcomes and program specific outcomes for analysis.

The college updates its IT facility at regular intervals to meet the demand of all stakeholders and ensure smooth conduct of academic and administrative matters with the aid of IT facilities. Academic, administration and admission matters was managed by a software called "College Manager" to manage its academic activities including internal examinations, report generation of students' internal evaluation processes, overall office automation of the college administration starting from students' admission till issuing the transfer certificates to the students.

College has 168 computers connected with Wi-Fi / LAN and adequate number of servers for the smooth functioning of labs. To cater the demand of fully fledged online teaching, college upgraded the internet network with 200 Mbps internet, 50 Mbps leased line facility and 35 Wi-Fi access points on 24 April 2021 and installed new computer/ laptops. 4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The College continuously strives to meet the growing demand of new pedagogical approaches by enhancing the available physical infrastructure and upgrading other supportive facilities by working in tune with the Planning body of the college. The planning body of the college comprising the Planning Committee (comprising of the Principal, Bursar, IQAC Coordinator and Head of the departments), Purchase Committee, Building Committee, Campus Development Cell and Library Advisory Committee, hold regular meetings across the academic year, to assess the physical, academic and other supportive requirements. The budget for each academic year is prepared by Purchase Committee as per the requirements on priority basis and funds are utilized as per the allocation.

Maintenance of Physical facility

The physical facilities and infrastructure are maintained and monitored by Bursar appointed by Corporate Educational Agency Kothamangalam. Academic and support facilities including adequate classrooms, properly maintained laboratories, computer centers, library, sports facilities like indoor stadium, gymnasium, College ground etc. are monitored by various committees and maintained under the supervision of bursar. Standard protocols are followed for the maintenance and maximum utilization of resources with technical team for trouble shooting and maintenance register for documentation.

Maintenance of laboratories and Classrooms

Maintenance and utilization of laboratory facilities are followed as per the Standard Operating Procedures with trained laboratory assistants under the supervision of the Head of the Department and other staff members. Classrooms with furniture and teaching aids are

maintained by the respective department staff and attendants and supervised by the respective Head of the Department and bursar.

Maintenance of library

The library facility is maintained with properly marked and arranged books for easy access by the students and faculty and automation for book issue and renewal. Periodicals, journals, newspapers and new arrivals are prominently displayed and all back issues are archived. Electronic version of text books and e- resources are made available to stakeholders through the library website for maximum utilization.

Maintenance of sports and games facility

The sports equipment, indoor stadium, Gymnasium and College ground are supervised and maintained by the Head of the Physical Education Department. The staff of the department ensures proper training and guidance for various indoor and outdoor sports and games, both for competition and for physical well being of all stake holders.

Maintenance of ICT Facility

The college has a team of technical staff for regular monitoring of the internet facilities, wifi, computers, other electronic gadgets and software installation and upgradations. All sophisticated instruments and facilities are maintained under Annual Maintenance Contracts. The bursar of the college monitors the House- Keeping Staff and the maintenance of the campus infrastructure. Maximum utilization of all resources are ensured by encouraging interdisciplinary and trans disciplinary research and academic activities, collaborating with universities and National/ State institutes for research, providing physical and academic facilities to school students, farmers and general public under various programmes and schemes without compromising the utility and availability to any stake holder.

The College Union Executive Committee is actively involved in the regular curricular and extra curricular activities of the college. It promotes and facilitates student activities of the campus. The college has a statutory Student Council, and the members are democratically elected in the presidential manner, according to University Statutes. Every student on the rolls has the right to vote in the process of election of class representatives through secret ballot. The Student Council comprises Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, General Secretary, Arts Club Secretary, Sports Club Secretary, Magazine Editor, two lady representatives and two University Union Councilors who function as the representatives of the students of this college in the University. The College Student Council is steered by a sprightly band of youngsters gifted with abundant leadership qualities. Due to COVID pandemic and online classes the normal procedures for the selection of officer bearers lagged and college continued the previous year student council with addition representatives from first year. The Students' Council in the year 2020-21 organized an array of online academic and extracurricular activities to enhance the skill acquisition, leadership qualities and discipline. It is a platform for the students to raise their demands, grievances, requirements to the college or management through their representatives. The functioning and activities of the Student Council are under the guidance of the Staff Advisor nominated by the Principal. The Principal is the President of the College Union Council. All important decisions are taken in the combined meetings of the union executive members, class representatives and association secretaries, which are convened regularly. The college has a multi-tiered governance system that functions, in pace with the vision and mission and, on the principles of decentralization and participative management. 6.1.2 - The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

The well-knit, multi-tiered administrative mechanism of college strictly sticks on to the principles of decentralization and participative management of all stakeholders from apex to grass root level. One instance of participatory and decentralized management of college is the implementation of project named Confront Covid Positively, in 2020. It was launched with the objective of equipping students, teachers and non teaching community to confront covid issues. 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ perspective plan is effectively deployed

The IQAC in consultation with the managing board formulated a strategic plan for the year in order to meet the needs of the various stakeholders and to ensure quality progress of the institution. As envisioned in the plan, the college has taken steps to meet with the increasing need of a fully furnished computer lab for the self-financing session. Expert building committee has been

formed to monitor the construction of the same with Principal as the chairman, a government nominee and 12 other members that include representatives from all stakeholders' group. Disregarding the covid impediments, the management took initiatives in commencing its construction in March 202 and could complete it by 2021 with the financial aid of management and Governing Board member Sri P. J. Joseph. Staff Council and IQAC through deliberations sought out the facilities required and building committee implemented it with appropriate interventions. 6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

The institution creates a conducive environment for professional

growth of its staff. Consistent quality checks and evaluations are practised through effective Performance Appraisal System. It functions in a four tiered way:

- Managerial Academic Audit is conducted every year where the teacher filled in Performance Appraisal Record is checked by an academic review committee headed by manager.
- Teacher Performance Record (TPR) is given to each teacher to record their everyday engagements. Details pertaining to lesson plans, tests, assignments, projects, and mentoring, tutoring, remedial classes, leave taken etc. are recorded and evaluated.
- Head of the departments prepares a confidential report in a prescribed format evaluating teachers' curricular and non curricular performance highlighting their strength and weakness.
- In each semester, students can evaluate their teachers online on the following criteria: accessibility to teacher, classroom management, communication skills, and fairness in internal assessment, ability to inspire and motivate, interaction of the teacher, punctuality and regularity, effective completion of syllabus in time, subject knowledge and the use of ICT in teaching learning process.

Management evaluates non-teaching staff every year through a performance appraisal system designed by IQAC. In a given format the principal, teachers and the students evaluate the non-teaching staff.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

A transparent and systematic financial management system is followed in institution. Institution conducts external and internal audits for Government and Non-Government funds.

Statutory Audit, of all accounts maintained by college, is done by a Chartered accountant every year. On behalf of Principal, Head Accountant maintains accounts of government funds. Statutory audit also includes auditing of all non-government funds including management funds, fees from self-financing courses, salary of management staff etc., the records/accounts of which is maintained by Bursar, the representative of Management.

Periodical Audit is conducted by Accounts General, Directorate of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala to verify utilisation of funds received from Central and state governments which include grants from UGC, NAAC, RUSA, DIST-FIST, KSCSTE, KSHEC and other government agencies.

External Financial Audit is done by Deputy Directorate of Education, Ernakulam, Government of Kerala. They conduct financial audit every year and analyse all registers and accounts of college. Audit team verifies financial utilization of public funds. They scrutinize Cash Book, acquittance of teaching and non-teaching staff, SC/ST/OEC acquittance, E-grants Account, Caution Deposit and Fee receipts. Government scrutinizes grants received from UGC in various plan periods for Minor Research Projects, National Seminars, IQAC, General Development Assistance UG and PG grants.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

College maintains well-knit policy for mobilization of funds and optimum utilisation of resources. Planning Board, constituted by Principal, plans, implements and supervises fundraising. It evaluates requirements of departments and forums for fund allocation. Budgetary provision for academic and administrative activities is planned at beginning of financial year. Planning Board functions in consultation various committees to formulate strategies for fund mobilisation.

Central government funds like UGC, NAAC, RUSA and ICSSR, DST-FIST DBT-STAR and scholarships are used for developmental activities, academic resources and infrastructure development including labs, equipment and sports facilities.

State government funds like KSCSTE and KSHEC, grant-in-aid for salary, fund for NSS, ASAP, WWS and SSP are availed for introducing innovative programmes, workshops, conferences, green initiatives, extension activities, student mentoring and for clubs. Non-Government Funds include endowment awards, funds raised by departments/associations, students' fee from self-financing courses, PTA funds, aid from philanthropists, contribution from teachers, contribution from alumni, and financial assistance from management and rent from SIB for ATM. These are used to meet developmental needs of institution. Optimal utilization of available resources is ensured to cater the needs of stakeholders. At financial year's end, internal and external auditing is conducted to ensure utilization and proper accounting of funds availed.

Practice 1

Incubation Cell

One of the major initiatives institutionalized by IQAC is the implementation of an Incubation Cell in the college. The cell was established with the aim of strengthening the critical thinking capacity and innovative ideas in students. Under the guidance of the cell 72 students were screened and selected for Reboot Kerala Hackathon Competition and they could bag top position. Also the cell played pivotal role in providing incubation support for energy conservation idea which was later awarded EMC Small Grant Project by Government of Kerala.

Practice 2

Purchase of LMS through G-suite

To confront the increasing need for teaching learning management in online platform, IQAC planned and purchased a common Google workspace for the institution. Google accounts for all teachers and students were created and classes were arranged regularly in google classrooms with the inclusion of ICT tools. Apart from live sessions, teachers created assignments queries, shared video and audio resources and conducted evaluation through this platform. Teachers and students depended on Google Docs, Spreadsheets, Presentations and Forms for creating reports, lecture notes, preparing slide shows, conducting tests and seeking feedback. INSTITUTIONAL VALUES AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 - Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

7.1.1 - Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the year

Gender equity is and always has been an issue of worldwide concern. Newman College has always given prime importance to the issue and ensures that gender sensitization measures are carried out properly. An Equal Opportunity Centre as prescribed by the UGC is functional in the college. Admission is based purely on merit and not gender biased. The various courses offered by the college include portions that foster the promotion of gender equity.

As part of the Annual Gender sensitization plans, various talk shows and women-oriented classes have been conducted by the women's cell of the college. Legal aid classes discussing various issues including sex- and gender- based issues are organized from time to time like The Gender Equality and Women's Right (8 August 2020), Legal Protection Against Sexual Crimes: POCSO Act and Child Rights (9 December 2020) and Cyber Crimes Enlightening for Women (1 January 2021). Co-curricular activities like baking classes, driving classes and ample opportunities to attempt various entrepreneurial ventures are provided.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

- To uphold the safety and security of the students, there is a solid compound wall around the campus. 24x7 Surveillance cameras are installed for their safety. All required basic facilities like ATM, canteen, gym, library, photocopiers, book stall, store, toilets, etc. are offered within the campus which ensures the ease of access and safety of the students.
- The hostel committee has the responsibility of monitoring the girls' hostel, which is located in close proximity to the college.
- There is a functional Grievance Redressal Forum in the college to hear and decide on disciplinary issues and curricular and co-curricular matters. We have an active ethics committee that monitors the implementation of the various government orders pertaining to on-campus issues. A dedicated anti-ragging squad that identifies and reports cases to the anti-Ragging Committee who spells out suitable punishment to the guilty is functional in the college.

COUNSELLING

- An active legal awareness club, grievance redressal cell, counselling cell and Women empowerment cell is functional in the campus. A full time counsellor, Ms. Julia Mackolil, is present on campus from the beginning of the year.

COMMON ROOMS

- The Student Amenity centre has ample toilet and dine-in facilities for the students to relax and socialize with each other. There is a spacious recreational room for the female students. The college canteen is also well-aerated and provides hygienic food while maintaining Covid-19 protocols. The ladies

BEST PRACTICE 1

Title: Community development through holistic education.

1. Objective of the practice

- To create social consciousness among students along with their education.
- To contribute to the well-being of the community
- To inculcate eco-friendly attitude in an environmentally vulnerable situation.
- To help the rural community achieve better opportunities in academic and vocational fields.

1. Context

The college being the first higher education institution of the high ranges it can never limit its scope to the academic matters alone. The community expects the intervention of the college in many aspects. The institution being the social and cultural capital of Idukki district, it can't be blind to the cultural and other social needs of the people alongside with its primary motive of providing quality education to all. The college also has the responsibility of protecting the needs of the agrarian community since most of the inhabitants find their livelihood from agriculture. The ecological sensitivity of the high ranges from where a considerable number of our students come, poses great threat to their educational, economic and cultural life. This bestows in us the responsibility of imbibing a sense of sustainable development of the community flavoured by ecological consciousness.

1. The Practice

To achieve the above objectives, the institution organizes several programmes. Through the mid day meal collection conducted every day, around 500 food packets are provided to the poor people in Thodupuzha Municipality. The institution has adopted a village in Kumaramangalam and involves in the developmental activities of the village. Programmes like door to door plastic eradication awareness programme, Swatch Bharat awareness, compost pit construction in the adopted village maintain a healthy living condition for the people of the village.

The college also extends its helping hand to places other than the adopted village in pandemic situation. Being the responsible youth, the students actively involved in the supporting activities during the pandemic. The students engaged in mask preparation and distribution of sanitizers during the covid -19 outbreak when these things were not easily available. These masks and sanitizers were freely distributed among the needy. The staff and students also contributed to the development of corona centers in cash and kind. We also provided quarantine facilities. The yearly agricultural fest hosted by the college and properly maintained greenery of the college also contributes the ecological consciousness of the institution. All initiatives are taken to avoid the usage of plastics in the campus. The campus also has a plastic shredding unit which recycles plastic wastes if any within the campus itself.

The institution also gives special consideration for the vocational needs of the community. By arranging placement drives for the students and public, it helps in the upward social mobility of many families. Students are directed not only to identify the problems in the society, but also to provide effective solutions in their capacity as a student. Participation in Reboot Kerala Hackathon - an initiative of the Department of Higher Education - Government of Kerala and ASAP (Additional Skill Acquisition programme) is an evidence for this. The programme helps students to find cost effective solutions for the removal of barriers in development of a state.

1. Evidence of Success

The initiative taken to achieve the objectives are successful to the maximum extend. Students themselves take the responsibility of collecting the food packets and their distribution without compulsion from the teachers. The active participation in organic farming, blood donation camps, flood relief etc., shows how the college molds students as socially committed citizens.

BEST PRACTICE 2

Title: Education based on moral values and global Competency

1. Objective of the programme

- Inculcate moral and ethical consciousness among students
- To enable the students to reflect and act upon moral issues in the society
- To help students achieve global standards in all activities

2. The context

In the rapidly developing society characterized by technological advancement, social harmony and humanitarian values are out of place. But many of the social issues can be tackled if people have strong ethical and moral values. So the coming generation should possess such values for the formation of a better society. This is the necessity of having value based education.

Due to the immense job opportunities in the global scenario education should be structured so as to build global competency in students. In the extremely competitive world where qualified candidates outnumber the required posts, being globally competent is mandatory. Here comes the relevance of an educational pattern that boost up global competency.

1. The practice

With the aim of triggering discussions over ethical problems and to give insights on practical measures for addressing them, separate time is given for value education classes every week. Materials are provided and exams are conducted. The winners are awarded prizes also. On a practical level students engage in activities like blood donation camps, midday meal schemes, anti-drug campaigns, women empowerment programmes, and observation of various days in

commemoration of great personalities who upheld human values. The students of our college actively took part in mask preparation and the distribution.

To build global competency in students several programmes are added to the curriculum. Special training in communication skills, group discussion, interview training etc., is given to equip students to compete in the extremely challenging job scenario. The college also makes arrangements for opening the online courses offered by foreign universities via Coursera and other online platforms. This gives them an additional benefit for the students. The research centres also promote research that meets global standards. Students are promoted to present papers in national and international conferences. Collaborations for research and programmes with reputed institutes like IUCAA, CUSAT, IARI etc. were also there to work towards achieving global competency.

1. Evidence of success

The number of placements, university ranks and NET-JRF winners bear testimony to the success of this practice. Ten 3 ranks and 21 UG ranks were received. Twenty Seven of our students got placed in various institutions. Nineteen students presented papers in various conferences. We have 11 NET holders, one JRF and 4 GATE holders during this academic year.

Newman College, in its quest to attain excellence in academics and research and to give promote STEM education to students with emphasis to experiential learning, made continuous efforts to get collaborations and grants from various directions. Identifying the Potential for excellence of the College, Department of Biotechnology, Govt. of India selected Newman College for DBT Star College Scheme under the Strengthening component, which gives special emphasis to STEM education and experiential learning. The college is one among the 15 institutions which got selected for this prestigious scheme in this academic year. The scheme supports interdisciplinary research, training programmes and other activities of various departments, namely, Botany & Biotechnology; Chemistry; Physics and Mathematics. Experiential learning was promoted during online teaching with the help of virtual lab visits, animated videos and various learning based activities.

The UGC STRIDE project on the "An Institutional Research Scheme on the Sustainable Development Initiatives in the Western Ghats in Idukki, Kerala" selected 100 undergraduate students from all disciplines of study as 'UGC STRIDE fellows'. The college took different measures to increase the research excellence of faculty and students and as part of that various interdisciplinary projects and research works are promoted among faculty and students.

The College being affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam follows the curriculum fixed by the University. An annual academic calendar including all the academic activities of the college is prepared by the IQAC in tune with the University academic calendar and department level academic plan and is integrated in the college handbook. Details of syllabus, weightage of examinations, study materials, question banks and academic plans are communicated to the students by publishing it in the website of the college. Faculty members from various departments in the college have contributed to the curriculum development and assessment of undergraduate and postgraduate programmes as Board of Studies members and question paper setters of Mahatma Gandhi University. Curriculum is complemented with certificate courses, add on programs, hands on activities, project/ field visits, study tours and value added initiatives by all the departments. Additional Skill Acquisition programme is implemented for developing academic skills. Bridge courses are conducted after an entry level test which helps to identify the students who require remedial teaching. Various clubs and cells along with a proactive NCC and NSS provide curricular and co-curricular options for the students to promote their interests. Regular class wise PTA is meetings monitor the feedback regarding regular completion of syllabus and evaluation. Feedback regarding curriculum is collected from students, alumni, employers, parents and teachers and evaluation is done to plan for the forthcoming academic years.

Outcome based education gives a chance for an overall learning where a student gets trained in all the program outcome laid by the University Board of Studies in syllabus. This ensures that a student not only possess a sound knowledge in the specific program they also can have a global mobility and acceptance. The institution follows the following practice of measuring the level of attainment of Course Outcomes (COs), Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs).

Attainment of course outcome: Course outcomes are measured directly based on the scores attained by the students on their internal and external evaluation on 20: 80 proportions. The internal evaluation includes scores obtained in two test papers for each semester, attendance and assignment presentations. During final semester there is a project evaluation score based on various strategies science subjects' performance of laboratory works for respective courses are also considered for each course in every semester.

Achievement of course outcome can also be measured indirectly by conducting class test papers, quizzes etc. The process of

measuring the attainment level of the students is comprehensive and continuous. A lot of other aspects also are taken into account though they cannot be specifically measured with a set standard.

The programme outcomes (PO) and PSOs can be measured in terms of achievements of students in the competitive examinations in the State and National level. This was testified by the increased rate of qualifiers in various national level examinations such as GATE, NET, JRF, and many other similar examinations of national repute. The rate of enrolment to higher education, placements, awards and recognitions received by the students during and after the academic periods are also good tools for measuring Programme.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

The college updates its IT facility at regular intervals to meet the demand of all stakeholders and ensure smooth conduct of academic and administrative matters with the aid of IT facilities. Academic, administration and admission matters was managed by a software called "College Manager" to manage its academic activities including internal examinations, report generation of students' internal evaluation processes, overall office automation of the college administration starting from students' admission till issuing the transfer certificates to the students.

College has 168 computers connected with Wi-Fi / LAN and adequate number of servers for the smooth functioning of labs. To cater the demand of fully fledged online teaching, college upgraded the internet network with 200 Mbps internet, 50 Mbps leased line facility and 35 Wi-Fi access points on 24 April 2021 and installed new computer/ laptops. Library is automated with LIBSOFT and has subscription to UGC INFLIBNET. Library updated its digital repository with the e- resources developed by faculty members and students.

The unlimited educational package of G suite is used to issue College mail ids to all students and faculty members for effective utilisation of G suite services as LMS. G suite with a business account upgradation was done in September 2021.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The College continuously strives to meet the growing demand of new pedagogical approaches by enhancing the available physical infrastructure and upgrading other supportive facilities by working in tune with the Planning body of the college. The planning body of the college comprising the Planning Committee (comprising of the Principal, Bursar, IQAC Coordinator and Head of the departments), Purchase Committee, Building Committee, Campus Development Cell and Library Advisory Committee, hold regular meetings across the academic year, to assess the physical, academic and other supportive requirements. The budget for each academic year is prepared by Purchase Committee as per the requirements on priority basis and funds are utilized as per the allocation.

Maintenance of Physical facility

The physical facilities and infrastructure are maintained and monitored by Bursar appointed by Corporate Educational Agency Kothamangalam. Academic and support facilities including adequate classrooms, properly maintained laboratories, computer centers, library, sports facilities like indoor stadium, gymnasium, College ground etc. are monitored by various committees and maintained under the supervision of bursar. Standard protocols are followed for the maintenance and maximum utilization of resources with technical team for trouble shooting and maintenance register for documentation.

Maintenance of laboratories and Classrooms

Maintenance and utilization of laboratory facilities are followed as per the Standard Operating Procedures with trained laboratory

assistants under the supervision of the Head of the Department and other staff members. Classrooms with furniture and teaching aids are maintained by the respective department staff and attendants and supervised by the respective Head of the Department and bursar.

Maintenance of library

The library facility is maintained with properly marked and arranged books for easy access by the students and faculty and automation for book issue and renewal. Periodicals, journals, newspapers and new arrivals are prominently displayed and all back issues are archived. Electronic version of text books and e-resources are made available to stakeholders through the library website for maximum utilization.

Maintenance of sports and games facility

The sports equipment, indoor stadium, Gymnasium and College ground are supervised and maintained by the Head of the Physical Education Department. The staff of the department ensures proper training and guidance for various indoor and outdoor sports and games, both for competition and for physical well being of all stake holders.

Maintenance of ICT Facility

The college has a team of technical staff for regular monitoring of the internet facilities, wifi, computers, other electronic gadgets and software installation and upgradations. All sophisticated instruments and facilities are maintained under Annual Maintenance Contracts. The bursar of the college monitors the House- Keeping Staff and the maintenance of the campus infrastructure. Maximum utilization of all resources are ensured by encouraging interdisciplinary and trans disciplinary research and academic activities, collaborating with universities and National/ State institutes for research, providing physical and academic facilities to school students, farmers and general public under various programmes and schemes without compromising the utility and availability to any stake holder.

5.3.2 - Institution facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative, co-curricular and extracurricular activities (student council/ students representation on various bodies as per established processes and norms)

The College Union Executive Committee is actively involved in the regular curricular and extra curricular activities of the college. It promotes and facilitates student activities of the campus. The college has a statutory Student Council, and the members are democratically elected in the presidential manner, according to University Statutes. Every student on the rolls has the right to vote in the process of election of class representatives through secret ballot. The Student Council comprises Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, General Secretary, Arts Club Secretary, Sports Club Secretary, Magazine Editor, two lady representatives and two University Union Councilors who function as the representatives of the students of this college in the University. The College Student Council is steered by a sprightly band of youngsters gifted with abundant leadership qualities. Due to COVID pandemic and online classes the normal procedures for the selection of officer bearers lagged and college continued the previous year student council with addition representatives from first year. The Students' Council in the year 2020-21 organized an array of online academic and extracurricular activities to enhance the skill acquisition, leadership qualities and discipline. It is a platform for the students to raise their demands, grievances, requirements to the college or management through their representatives. The functioning and activities of the Student Council are under the guidance of the Staff Advisor nominated by the Principal. The Principal is the President of the College Union Council. All important decisions are taken in the combined meetings of the union executive members, class representatives and association secretaries, which are convened regularly. 6.1.2 - The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

The well-knit, multi-tiered administrative mechanism of college strictly sticks on to the principles of decentralization and participative management of all stakeholders from apex to grass root level. One instance of participatory and decentralized management of college is the implementation of project named Confront Covid Positively, in 2020. It was launched with the objective of equipping students, teachers and non teaching community to confront covid issues. Project germinated from parents of II BA English class in a PTA meeting conducted for them on 17 July 2020. 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ perspective plan is effectively deployed

The IQAC in consultation with the managing board formulated a strategic plan for the year in order to meet the needs of the various stakeholders and to ensure quality progress of the institution. As envisioned in the plan, the college has taken steps to meet with the increasing need of a fully furnished computer lab for the self-financing session. Expert building committee has been formed to monitor the construction of the same with Principal as the chairman, a government nominee and 12 other members that include representatives from all stakeholders' group. Disregarding the covid impediments, the management took initiatives in commencing its construction in March 202 and could complete it by 2021 with the financial aid of management and Governing Board member Sri P. 6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

The institution creates a conducive environment for professional growth of its staff. Consistent quality checks and evaluations are practised through effective Performance Appraisal System. It functions in a four tiered way:

- Managerial Academic Audit is conducted every year where the teacher filled in Performance Appraisal Record is checked by an academic review committee headed by manager.
- Teacher Performance Record (TPR) is given to each teacher to record their everyday engagements. Details pertaining to lesson plans, tests, assignments, projects, and mentoring, tutoring, remedial classes, leave taken etc. are recorded and evaluated.
- Head of the departments prepares a confidential report in a prescribed format evaluating teachers' curricular and non curricular performance highlighting their strength and weakness.
- In each semester, students can evaluate their teachers online on the following criteria: accessibility to teacher, classroom management, communication skills, and fairness in internal assessment, ability to inspire and motivate, interaction of the teacher, punctuality and regularity, effective completion of syllabus in time, subject knowledge and the use of ICT in teaching learning process.

Management evaluates non-teaching staff every year through a performance appraisal system designed by IQAC. In a given format the principal, teachers and the students evaluate the non-teaching staff.

Statutory audit also includes auditing of all non-government funds including management funds, fees from self-financing courses, salary of management staff etc., the records/accounts of which is maintained by Bursar, the representative of Management.

Periodical Audit is conducted by Accounts General, Directorate of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala to verify utilisation of funds received from Central and state governments which include grants from UGC, NAAC, RUSA, DIST-FIST, KSCSTE, KSHEC and other government agencies.

External Financial Audit is done by Deputy Directorate of Education, Ernakulam, Government of Kerala. They conduct financial audit every year and analyse all registers and accounts of college. Audit team verifies financial utilization of public funds. They scrutinize Cash Book, acquittance of teaching and non-teaching staff, SC/ST/OEC acquittance, E-grants Account, Caution Deposit and Fee receipts. Government scrutinizes grants received from UGC in various plan periods for Minor Research Projects, National Seminars, IQAC, General Development Assistance UG and PG grants.

College maintains well-knit policy for mobilization of funds and optimum utilisation of resources. Planning Board, constituted by Principal, plans, implements and supervises fundraising. It evaluates requirements of departments and forums for fund allocation. Budgetary provision for academic and administrative activities is planned at beginning of financial year. Planning Board functions in consultation various committees to formulate strategies for fund mobilisation.

Central government funds like UGC, NAAC, RUSA and ICSSR, DST-FIST DBT-STAR and scholarships are used for developmental activities, academic resources and infrastructure development including labs, equipment and sports facilities.

State government funds like KSCSTE and KSHEC, grant-in-aid for salary, fund for NSS, ASAP, WWS and SSP are availed for introducing innovative programmes, workshops, conferences, green initiatives, extension activities, student mentoring and for

clubs. Non-Government Funds include endowment awards, funds raised by departments/associations, students' fee from self-financing courses, PTA funds, aid from philanthropists, contribution from teachers, contribution from alumni, and financial assistance from management and rent from SIB for ATM. These are used to meet developmental needs of institution. Optimal utilization of available resources is ensured to cater the needs of stakeholders. At financial year's end, internal and external auditing is conducted to ensure utilization and proper accounting of funds availed.

Practise 1

Incubation Cell

One of the major initiatives institutionalized by IQAC is the implementation of an Incubation Cell in the college. The cell was established with the aim of strengthening the critical thinking capacity and innovative ideas in students. Under the guidance of the cell 72 students were screened and selected for Reboot Kerala Hackathon Competition and they could bag top position. Also the cell played pivotal role in providing incubation support for energy conservation idea which was later awarded EMC Small Grant Project by Government of Kerala.

Practice 2

Purchase of LMS through G-suite

To confront the increasing need for teaching learning management in online platform, IQAC planned and purchased a common Google

workspace for the institution. Google accounts for all teachers and students were created and classes were arranged regularly in google classrooms with the inclusion of ICT tools. Apart from live sessions, teachers created assignments queries, shared video and audio resources and conducted evaluation through this platform. Teachers and students depended on Google Docs, Spreadsheets, Presentations and Forms for creating reports, lecture notes, preparing slide shows, conducting tests and seeking feedback. It also proved to be an apt medium for conducting webinars of national and international levels.

7.1.1 - Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the year

Gender equity is and always has been an issue of worldwide concern. Newman College has always given prime importance to the issue and ensures that gender sensitization measures are carried out properly. An Equal Opportunity Centre as prescribed by the UGC is functional in the college. Admission is based purely on merit and not gender biased. The various courses offered by the college include portions that foster the promotion of gender equity.

As part of the Annual Gender sensitization plans, various talk shows and women-oriented classes have been conducted by the women's cell of the college. Legal aid classes discussing various issues including sex- and gender- based issues are organized from time to time like The Gender Equality and Women's Right (8 August 2020), Legal Protection Against Sexual Crimes: POCSO Act and Child Rights (9 December 2020) and Cyber Crimes Enlightening for Women (1 January 2021). Co-curricular activities like baking classes, driving classes and ample opportunities to attempt various entrepreneurial ventures are provided.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

- To uphold the safety and security of the students, there is a solid compound wall around the campus. 24x7 Surveillance cameras are installed for their safety. All required basic facilities like ATM, canteen, gym, library, photocopiers, book stall, store, toilets, etc. are offered within the campus which ensures the ease of access and safety of the students.
- The hostel committee has the responsibility of monitoring the girls' hostel, which is located in close proximity to the college.
- There is a functional Grievance Redressal Forum in the college to hear and decide on disciplinary issues and curricular and co-curricular matters. We have an active ethics committee that monitors the implementation of the various government orders pertaining to on-campus issues. A dedicated anti-ragging squad that identifies and reports cases to the anti-Ragging Committee who spells out suitable punishment to the guilty is functional in the college.

COUNSELLING

- An active legal awareness club, grievance redressal cell, counselling cell and Women empowerment cell is functional in the campus. A full time counsellor, Ms. Julia Mackolil, is present on campus from the beginning of the year.

COMMON ROOMS

- The Student Amenity centre has ample toilet and dine-in facilities for the students to relax and socialize with each other. There is a spacious recreational room for the female students. The college canteen is also well-aerated and provides hygienic food while maintaining Covid-19 protocols. The ladies washroom is installed with sanitary napkin dispensers and incineration facilities.

SPECIAL NEEDS

- Various student support services are offered to ensure the assistance to the Students With Special Needs and the differently-abled under the guidance of the faculty. An Enabling Unit for Differently-abled Persons functions in the college. Ramps with handrails are provided below each main block.
- A special area is reserved in the library for students with special needs. Newman uses open source Braille software (Braille Blaster) and screen reading software (NVDA). The library has Braille and screen reading software KiboWeb by Trestle Labs installed recently.

BEST PRACTICE 1

Title: Community development through holistic education.

1. Objective of the practice

- To create social consciousness among students along with their education.
- To contribute to the well-being of the community
- To inculcate eco-friendly attitude in an environmentally vulnerable situation.
- To help the rural community achieve better opportunities in academic and vocational fields.

1. Context

The college being the first higher education institution of the high ranges it can never limit its scope to the academic matters alone. The community expects the intervention of the college in many aspects. The institution being the social and cultural capital of Idukki district, it can't be blind to the cultural and other social needs of the people alongside with its primary motive of providing quality education to all. The college also has the responsibility of protecting the needs of the agrarian community since most of the inhabitants find their livelihood from agriculture. The ecological sensitivity of the high ranges from where a considerable number of our students come, poses great threat to their educational, economic and cultural life. This bestows in us the responsibility of imbibing a sense of sustainable development of the community flavoured by ecological consciousness.

1. The Practice

To achieve the above objectives, the institution organizes several programmes. Through the mid day meal collection conducted every day, around 500 food packets are provided to the poor people in Thodupuzha Municipality. The institution has adopted a village in Kumaramangalam and involves in the developmental activities of the village. Programmes like door to door plastic eradication awareness programme, Swatch Bharat awareness, compost pit construction in the adopted village maintain a healthy living condition for the people of the village.

The college also extends its helping hand to places other than

the adopted village in pandemic situation. Being the responsible youth, the students actively involved in the supporting activities during the pandemic. The students engaged in mask preparation and distribution of sanitizers during the covid -19 outbreak when these things were not easily available. These masks and sanitizers were freely distributed among the needy. The staff and students also contributed to the development of corona centers in cash and kind. We also provided quarantine facilities. The yearly agricultural fest hosted by the college and properly maintained greenery of the college also contributes the ecological consciousness of the institution. All initiatives are taken to avoid the usage of plastics in the campus. The campus also has a plastic shredding unit which recycles plastic wastes if any within the campus itself.

The institution also gives special consideration for the vocational needs of the community. By arranging placement drives for the students and public, it helps in the upward social mobility of many families. Students are directed not only to identify the problems in the society, but also to provide effective solutions in their capacity as a student. Participation in Reboot Kerala Hackathon - an initiative of the Department of Higher Education - Government of Kerala and ASAP (Additional Skill Acquisition programme) is an evidence for this. The programme helps students to find cost effective solutions for the removal of barriers in development of a state.

1. Evidence of Success

The initiative taken to achieve the objectives are successful to the maximum extend. Students themselves take the responsibility of collecting the food packets and their distribution without compulsion from the teachers. The active participation in organic farming, blood donation camps, flood relief etc., shows how the college molds students as socially committed citizens.

Title: Education based on moral values and global Competency

1. Objective of the programme

- Inculcate moral and ethical consciousness among students
- To enable the students to reflect and act upon moral issues in the society

2. The context

In the rapidly developing society characterized by technological advancement, social harmony and humanitarian values are out of place. But many of the social issues can be tackled if people have strong ethical and moral values. So the coming generation should possess such values for the formation of a better society. This is the necessity of having value based education.

Due to the immense job opportunities in the global scenario education should be structured so as to build global competency in students. In the extremely competitive world where qualified candidates outnumber the required posts, being globally competent is mandatory. Here comes the relevance of an educational pattern that boost up global competency.

1. The practice

With the aim of triggering discussions over ethical problems and to give insights on practical measures for addressing them, separate time is given for value education classes every week. Materials are provided and exams are conducted. The winners are awarded prizes also. On a practical level students engage in activities like blood donation camps, midday meal schemes, anti-drug campaigns, women empowerment programmes, and observation of various days in commemoration of great personalities who upheld human values. The students of our college actively took part in mask preparation and the distribution.

To build global competency in students several programmes are added to the curriculum. Special training in communication skills, group discussion, interview training etc., is given to equip students to compete in the extremely challenging job

scenario. The college also makes arrangements for opening the online courses offered by foreign universities via Coursera and other online platforms. This gives them an additional benefit for the students. The research centres also promote research that meets global standards. Students are promoted to present papers in national and international conferences. Collaborations for research and programmes with reputed institutes like IUCAA, CUSAT, IARI etc. were also there to work towards achieving global competency.

1. Evidence of success

The number of placements, university ranks and NET-JRF winners bear testimony to the success of this practice. Ten 3 ranks and 21 UG ranks were received. Twenty Seven of our students got placed in various institutions. Nineteen students presented papers in various conferences. We have 11 NET holders, one JRF and 4 GATE holders during this academic year.
